INTRODUCTION

The Truckee Fire Protection District is offering rebates for home hardening upgrades. Home hardening addresses the most vulnerable components of a structure with building materials and installation techniques that increase resistance to wildfire heat, flames, and embers.

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Eligible residents must have had Defensible Space Inspection within the past 12 months in order to apply. Rebates can only be awarded as reimbursement for home hardening upgrades that were identified in the inspection. Upon successful completion of the project, TFPD will issue a rebate of up to 50% of the project cost, not to exceed \$500. Home hardening and defensible space go hand in hand; therefore, applicants must also resolve defensible space issues in Zone Zero prior to applying. See further details below.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE

1. **Schedule** a defensible space inspection

- Sign up online or call 530-582-7888
- Already had an inspection? Access your report online or call us for a printed copy. Confirm that inspection was completed within the past 12 months.

2. Complete upgrades

- Make as many eligible home hardening upgrades as possible.
- Take before and after photos of upgraded item(s).
- Resolve ALL defensible space issues within Zone Zero (the first five feet of your structure). Zone Zero must be free of:
 - Combustible mulch and firewood
 - o Pine needles / leaf litter on the roof, in the gutters, on or under the deck, or on the ground within the first 5 feet of the structure
 - Tree limbs overhanging or touching the roof, eaves, or siding
 - o Construction material or other combustibles under decks or within the first 5 feet of the structure
 - High fire hazard plants
 - Unmaintained vegetation (with dead branches, or collecting dead leaves and pine needles underneath)

3. **Confirm** resolutions

Submit photos and comments on your report online.

- Schedule a reinspection online or by calling 530-582-7888.
- In some cases, a re-inspection may be required after photos are submitted.

4. **Request** rebate

- Complete rebate application online.
- Attach receipts/invoices/photos to the online application.

REBATE APPLICATION

Access the rebate application online or use physical application at the end of this document.

APPLICATION REVIEW PROCESS

- Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis in the order in which they're received. Please allow 2-4 weeks for review and response.
- You will be notified when the application is approved, or if additional information is required.
- Rebates will be issued in the form of a check, in the name of the registered property owner and mailed to the address provided on the rebate application.
- Rebate checks will be mailed within 30 days of approval of your application.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- Receipts and labor/service invoices. These must be legible and clearly identify:
 - the date
 - o the cost specific to the home hardening upgrade
 - o and, where applicable:
 - o the property where work was completed
 - o the name of the contractor
- Project Photos
 - These must be clear photos that show the work area from the same angle BEFORE and AFTER the work has been completed.

FLIGIBILITY

Eligible Property/Participant

- Property must be within the Truckee Fire Protection District boundaries.
- Property must have a Defensible Space Inspection from Truckee Fire (or designee) within the past 12 months.
- Existing, permitted structures only (no new construction; no outbuildings or sheds).
- ZONE ZERO (the first five feet surrounding your home) must be free of:
 - Combustible mulch and firewood,
 - Pine needles / leaf litter on the roof, in the gutters, on or under the deck, or on the ground within the first 5 feet of the structure,
 - o Tree limbs overhanging or touching the roof, eaves, or siding,
 - Construction material or other combustibles under decks or within the first 5 feet of the structure,
 - High fire hazard plants,
 - Unmaintained vegetation (with dead branches, or collecting dead leaves and pine needles underneath).

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Upgraded item(s) must be noted on Defensible Space Inspection Report.

Eligible Upgrades

TFPD is supporting upgrades to existing structures that will improve wildfire resiliency and may improve insurability or qualify residents for insurance discounts. Eligible upgrades:

- Must be identified on a Defensible Space Inspection Report within the past 12 months.
- Purchases and work must be completed on or after the start date of this rebate program (August 14, 2023).
- The applicant is responsible for obtaining any permits and design approvals to complete the work:
 - Contact your Homeowners Association.
 - o Contact your jurisdiction for permitting information: Nevada Co., Town of Truckee, Placer Co.

- Materials affixed to the structure for home hardening or tarps that will enclose firewood.
- Labor/services for the installation of home hardening materials.

Home Hardening Rebate FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

QUESTION	ANSWER
I'm a long-term renter, am I eligible?	Currently, only a registered owner may submit for and receive the rebate.
I'm a beneficiary of the trust that owns the property, am I eligible?	Yes, just submit evidence of ownership along with your receipts.
The home hardening upgrade I want to do is an eligible upgrade but doesn't appear on my inspection report	Schedule a reinspection and let's get it on your report!
How recent must the inspection be?	Within 12 months of the work being done.
How do I access my inspection?	Go to www.defensiblespacereport.org/truckee ; enter your address and the 6-character code (combination of letters and numbers) you received on your door hanger. If this is your first time accessing the report online, you'll need to enter your contact information. If you don't know your code, or have any difficulty, click the button to submit a request or contact us at 530-582-7888.
I don't have a computer / internet access / an email address, how do I participate?	Use the printable rebate application at the end of this document, or pick up a paper copy at 10049 Donner Pass Road. Call our office to request your inspections at 530-582-7888. Return your completed rebate application with copies if your receipts/invoices to 10049 Donner Pass Road.
How do I see the Home Hardening recommendations on my report?	Go to www.defensiblespacereport.org/truckee ; enter your address and the 6-character code (combination of letters and numbers) you received on your door hanger. (If this is your first time accessing the report online, you'll need to enter your contact information.) Click on the grey text "Home Hardening".
What is Zone Zero?	The area nearest your house, from 0' to 5', including the surfaces of the structure itself and the area under attached decks and stair landings. This is the most vulnerable area. We call this "ZONE ZERO," because it's ground-zero when it comes to protecting your home from embers. There should be ZERO combustibles in this zone!
How do I resolve my outstanding Zone Zero defensible space violations?	There should be ZERO combustibles in this zone! Review the defensible space requirements on your report, and address the ones that occur within 5 feet of your structure (including under decks, on/above roofs, etc.)
Does this mean I can't have any outstanding defensible space violations?	Zone Zero is the most vulnerable area around your house. Home hardening and defensible space go hand in hand, so Zone Zero should be addressed at the same time as upgrading your structure.
How do I know if I was inspected?	If you received a tag on your door or a notice in the mail, you likely had a "curbside" inspection, and the first page of your report will say so. Go to www.defensiblespacereport.org/truckee to submit a request for your access code, or www.truckeefire.org/HardenYourHome to schedule a full inspection.

How is this program being funded?	This rebate program is funded by the Community Wildfire Prevention Fund, which was created with the passage of Measure T in 2021.
I have an ADU in addition to my primary structure, can I submit for the upgrades on that?	Yes, as long as it's a permitted structure.
I'm building a home / ADU, is that eligible?	No.
My wooden fence isn't ATTACHED to my house but abuts it. Is that eligible?	Yes.
Is my fire-retardant gel or sprinkler system eligible?	No.
Is landscaping work eligible?	No.

What does ember resistant / ignition resistant mean?	Ignition-resistant building materials are those that resist ignition or sustained burning when exposed to embers and small flames from wildfires. Examples of ignition-resistant materials include "noncombustible materials" that don't burn, exterior grade fire-retardant-treated wood lumber, fire-retardant-treated wood shakes and shingles listed by the State Fire Marshal (SFM) and any material that has been tested in accordance with SFM Standard 12-7A-5.
Does this work require a permit? How do I get it permitted?	Please check with the local Building Department for more information. Compliance with applicable state or county building codes and associated fees are the landowner's responsibility.
